



The goal of Word Game Time is to help students succeed. The site provides content for kindergarten through 7th-grade students in spelling, typing, reading, geography, and language arts.

Word Game Time features a user-friendly site with content organized by grade, subject, and type. The language arts section includes activities that help students with letter-sound recognition, parts of speech, subject-verb agreement, and other essential skills. Another noteworthy feature is the educational videos, which are fun and engaging for all grade levels. Some videos are animated, while others offer instruction from a teacher.

Word Game Time is similar to websites like ABCYa.com and Funbrain.com. However, what sets it apart is the variety of free worksheets available for parents, teachers, and students. While some sites offer worksheets, the ones on Word Game Time cover a wide range of topics, including poetry, homophones, and dictionary practice.

What I hope comes through in this work is the real need to shift how we support them—not by adding more to their plates, but by rethinking how we value, structure, and care for those in leadership."

UOG Graduate Student Award Nomination:



Faculty Scholarship Spotlight: Drs. Rebecca and Andrew Grunzke

This past semester, Drs. Rebecca and Andrew Grunzke have been actively engaged in their scholarship, culminating in presentations at the annual meeting of the Popular Culture Association/American Culture Association in New Orleans, LA, this April.

Dr. Andrew Grunzke presented "Bringing a Raygun to the War on Higher Education: Anti-Intellectualism's Role in the Olympic Fiasco." His paper analyzed the criticisms leveled against Dr. Rachel Gunn of Macquarie University (B-girl Raygun from the Olympics), exploring how these attacks reflect broader anti-intellectual trends impacting higher education.

Dr. Rebecca Grunzke presented her paper, "Governesses in Popular Culture: The Coming of Age of the Victorian Status Symbol." This research examined the evolving portrayal of governesses in popular film and television, from classics like *The Sound of Music* and *The King and I* to *Dark Shadows* and *Star Trek: Voyager*. This paper developed from her contribution to their forthcoming edited volume, *The Female Teacher on Television: Shifting Stereotype on the Small Screen*. The book, being published by Bloomsbury Press out in July, represents several years of hard work, featuring some highly respected scholars in education and television/media studies.




